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FIRE SAFETY TIPS

Fire Department

The Farmington City Fire Department is very concerned with the upcoming fire and fireworks season. The hillsides and forest service areas located around Farmington are beginning to dry out, which will create ideal conditions for a fire to start and spread rapidly. With this in mind all residents need to approach the upcoming fireworks celebrations with extreme caution.

The Farmington City Fire Department wishes everyone a safe fireworks season. Abiding by the established rules and regulations will help prevent injuries and loss of property. Please remember that fireworks should only be discharged between the approved dates of July 1-7 & July 21-27 and no discharge of fireworks is allowed in Woodland Park due to the high fuel load. Discharge of fireworks is also prohibited on any undeveloped lot or any adjacent property.

This state of the art roller coaster features unique elements like vertical lift, inverted loop, diving loop and underground tunnel—unlike anything else in the country. Riders are lifted over 200 feet on a vertical lift, plunged into a free fall at a break-over angle into an underground tunnel, and transported up to 70 miles per hour through three inversions. The ride can handle a capacity of 1,200 riders per hour. True to its name, Cannibal will eat other roller coasters in their tracks.

At the roller coaster's preview on June 22, city officials were invited to take a premier ride. "I've been to amusement parks all over the country, and let me say this about the new Lagoon ride Cannibal. It is a ride for all thrill seekers and will exceed your expectations. Don't let this ride pass you by. Cannibal is a total rush of exhilaration for those seeking a roller coaster high at its very best," said Mayor James Talbot.

The fire department will increase its staffing level during the 14 days of permitted fireworks discharge. Citations will be issued to those discharging illegal fireworks, discharging fireworks in restricted areas, and/or discharging fireworks in a manner that threatens the safety of the community.

In the right-hand column are 4 guidelines and recommendations to help keep everyone safe and to prevent fires during the month of July and all year long.

If we all work together to only discharge fireworks in approved locations and during the approved dates and take a good look at our homes to create defensible space with Firewise Landscaping, we can help prevent fires from happening and enjoy this fire and fireworks season together safely. Remember to observe and report the illegal use of fireworks by notifying your local authorities.

- 1** Fireworks should only be discharged between the approved dates of July 1-7 & July 21-27.
- 2** Fireworks should only be discharged in the approved city locations. Those locations can be viewed on the city website at farmington.utah.gov/fire.fireworksrestriction.html.

WATER RESTRICTIONS
 You Should Know...
Effective now, secondary water may be used no more than 3 days per week until Labor Day and only before 10:00 am and after 6:00 pm. No excessive watering is allowed anytime.

Northern Utah residents are experiencing the challenges of reducing water consumption. Record low snow accumulation during the past winter has drawn attention to our limited water supplies. The Weber Basin Water Conservancy District urges all users to follow conservation practices. District personnel is patrolling their service areas to ensure restrictions are observed. Those who fail to comply will risk losing secondary water service for the remainder of the season. The district will cease all irrigation and secondary water deliveries earlier this year than in past years to help conserve water for next year's needs.

In addition to penalties put in place by Weber Basin Water for the misuse of secondary water, Farmington City reminds residents that use of culinary water outdoors is against city ordinance. Violations may result in citations issued by the Farmington Police Department, fines and disconnection of culinary water. Cross connections between culinary and secondary water are illegal and will result in fines and citations. The steel roller coaster was primarily manufactured and constructed locally. Two lion statues that once were part of the Utah State Capitol sit atop pedestals at the ride's entry. Sculptures created by Gustave Eiffel compliment the themed pillars and decorative elements along the ride's entrance. The sound and cooling effect of waterfalls add to the atmosphere of Cannibal.

Lagoon's rich and colorful history is a vital piece and in many ways intertwined with Farmington's history. The amusement park contributes to the health of the city in a myriad of ways, supporting and supplementing city events and initiatives. For decades, Lagoon has been important to the city's economy, attracting people from all over the region to spend their dollars here.
