GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 3, 2015

A primary election was held last August, with an impressive overall voter turnout of near 25%. The candidates in the general election will be as follows:

The general election will be held on Tuesday, November 3, for three city council positions. All three positions will be four-year terms beginning January 2016. This will be a vote-by-mail election, giving residents the ability to vote at their convenience. There will be three easy ways to vote:

Return your ballot by putting it in the mail

Return your ballot in the drop box at Farmington City Hall (160 South Main)

Vote at the Community Arts Center on election day (120 South Main)

If residents do not wish to vote by mail, one polling location will be open on election day. To vote at the polls, go to the Farmington Community Arts Center at 120 South Main between 7:00 am and 8:00 pm. Proper identification will be required in order to vote.

BUILDING OCCUPANCY RESUMPTION PROGRAM

The Farmington City building department has been working on a new program called Building Occupancy Resumption Program, or BORP. BORP will assist Farmington in the event of an earthquake or other natural disaster that may result in damage to buildings. The city's building department inspection resources will likely be strained beyond capacity by voluminous requests to determine whether buildings are safe to occupy. Inspection resources will be allocated with the primary intent of addressing public safety, with the highest concerns being homes and shelters rather than attempting to facilitate the resumption of business operations.

Building owners or authorized representatives may request participation in this program at any time except during the aftermath of a natural disaster resulting in a declared state of emergency. Individuals participating in the BORP will be able to hire their own team to inspect the qualifying buildings and will be allowed to indicate through signs or placards the structural safeness of the business or home. A red sign means the business is unsafe to enter; a yellow sign means some damage or partial restriction; and a green sign means the structure is safe to enter.

Currently, Farmington City has only two inspectors who are certified to placard buildings following an emergency. Having only two certified inspectors could mean a backlog of inspections, leaving many businesses closed for days or weeks. Having the BORP in place prior to an emergency would help speed up the efforts in getting a business open.

Autumn Leaf Collection continued

Holding their leaves late into the season, Farmington's stately sycamore trees present a particular challenge for residents living along Main and State streets. With that in mind, this policy reminder goes to all city residents. Farmington City will pick up leaves in the following areas:

- ▶ Main Street from 100 South to 500 North
- ▶ State Street from 400 West to 300 East
- ▶ 200 West from State to 200 South
- ▶ 400 North from Main to 100 East

The street sweeper will be in these areas on a regular basis. Please do not put any sticks or twigs over 6 inches long in the gutter, as these types of materials plug the vacuum hose. If you do not live in the areas listed above, you are responsible to collect and dispose of the leaves on your property. Please do not put your leaves in the street. 



Farmington City is partnering with The Paul Moore Foundation for its inaugural 5K Fun Run/Walk on October 10, 2015 at Forbush Park. Activities at the event will include the 5K, silent auction, local food trucks and carnival activities.

In February of this year, Farmington resident Paul Moore was diagnosed with renal cancer. After months of aggressive treatments, he learned that the cancer is still progressing. Joni, his wife, will soon be a single parent to their two daughters ages 3 and 5.

Friends and neighbors, eager to help the Moore family, searched for existing foundations or organizations which could lend support.

Finding none, The Paul Moore Foundation was created to assist young families faced with losing a parent to cancer or other terminal illness. Families confront a wide spectrum of challenges when given a terminal diagnosis; the Foundation's goal is to ease the financial strain and provide living expenses during a transitional period.

WATER CONSERVATION

Farmington residents' efforts to reduce water consumption during the summer season has been effective. THANK YOU for your wise use and conservation of this valuable resource. Summer is now over and fall has arrived. It is important to remember that just because we're out of the driest season, the drought is not over. Water conservation should be a daily, year-round habit for all of us.

Shorter days mean less sun and less time for plants to grow. Less plant growth means most plants need less water.

Add mulch to your plant beds to encourage water retention

Redirect downspouts away from pavement and into lawn, trees or gardens. Extend the downspout if necessary.

Consider using a rain barrel to collect and store rain water runoff throughout the wet months.

Most water is wasted outdoors, but did you know that showers are the largest indoor water waster? Would it benefit your family to sit down together and review these easy water saving tips?

Keep showers to 5 minutes (a shower timer is handy)

Run the dishwasher and washing machine with full loads only

Fill the sink when hand washing dishes—don't let the water run

Don't use the toilet as a waste-basket

Establishing good habits for ourselves and our families will benefit us all in the future. And, just for good measure, keep your fingers crossed for a wet winter.

Farmington City has modeled this plan after Murray and Salt Lake City, who modeled their programs after San Francisco. This is a great opportunity for businesses, and the city is excited to see the project up and running. Thanks to Farmington's elected officials for seeing this BORP through.
