Ready for Spring Cleanup ?

The citywide residential spring cleanup will begin March 26. ***This service is for residential limbs and branches only.*** Residents are strongly encouraged to follow the rules outlined in this article so that city streets are restored to order as quickly as possible. **RULES WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED.**

- Limbs must be cut so that they are no longer than 5 feet or wider than 8 inches.

- Limbs and branches must be stacked at the curb in a pile no larger than approximately 10 feet long, 6 feet wide and 4 feet high (one 10-wheel dump truck load per residence). Stacking limbs in the same direction allows for more volume in the pile.
- Material must be placed at the curb before beginning collection day.

On May 1st, the city will re-evaluate gym hours and make adjustments that best serve Farmington residents in a financially responsible way.

- Collection trucks will only drive by your home ONCE.
- No bags or boxes
- Leaves can be left in piles

Materials collected will be mulched at the Central Davis Sewer District Treatment Plant.

The collection schedule will be as follows:

- **Monday, March 26**—north half of the city, from State Street to the city limits, including the Oakridge area.
- **Monday, April 2**—south half of the city, from State Street to the city limits, including west Farmington.

Street sweeping will be done after spring cleanup is completed. Because they will plug the vacuum hose, the sweeper cannot pick up limbs or twigs over 6 inches long.

- *After the cleanup is done, please rake the limbs and twigs in your gutter and throw them in your garbage can.*

This will help the street sweeper be more efficient. 🌱



The Cut Pollution – Mow Electric lawn mower exchange program promotes cleaner air and healthier lives through Weber State University’s sustainability offices in partnership with the Davis County and Weber-Morgan Health Departments.

Did you know that running a gas-powered lawn mower for one hour is equal to driving a car 160 miles? The Cut Pollution - Mow Electric program helps Utahns improve local air quality by going electric.

Those who enter and are selected through an online lottery can turn in their operable gas-powered mower and receive a new Kobalt 40-volt cordless electric lawn mower with mulching capability for \$100. Fee waivers are available for those in need. Typical retail price of the electric mower is \$329.

Utahns who live in areas that regularly experience poor air quality (EPA air-quality non-attainment areas) are eligible for the program. To participate, enter the randomized online lottery. Applications will be accepted throughout March with winner notifications going out April 6. Those selected will have three days to pay \$100 in advance and choose an exchange time on Saturday, April 21.

The Mow Electric program has 762 mowers available. Funding was made possible with grants from the Utah Clean Air Partnership (UCAIR), the Utah Department of Environmental Quality (UDEQ), Weber State University’s sustainability offices, and the Davis County and Weber-Morgan Health Departments.

Have you ever wondered how to get rid of hazardous household waste? Items such as e-waste • paint • varnish • pesticides • lawn care products • aerosols • paint thinner • antifreeze, motor oil • diesel • gasoline • cleaning items • automotive products • rechargeable and lead acid batteries, etc. (in household quantities) are accepted at Wasatch Integrated Household Hazardous Waste Facility, located at the Davis Landfill. There is no charge for drop off of household hazardous waste. Hours of operation are the same as landfill operating hours—Monday through Saturday. For additional information call 801-614-5600.
